

Meet St. Barnabas

St. Barnabas was an important person in forming the early church and spreading the Gospel. The name “Barnabas” means “Son of Encouragement”. Encouragement can mean the act of grace.



St. Barnabas, born Joseph, was one of the earliest Christian Disciples in Jerusalem and was a Levite. He and St.

Paul took missionary journeys together defending Gentiles. St. Barnabas was one of the first Teachers at the Church of Antioch.

Barnabas’s story appears in the Acts of The Apostles and St. Paul mentions Barnabas in some of his epistles.

The Feast of St. Barnabas is celebrated on June 11th.

History

In 1844, Ms. Susanna Warfield petitioned for a new Chapel of Ease in Sykesville. The trip from Sykesville to the Holy Trinity Chapel in Eldersburg, about three miles, was considered too inconvenient and discouraged regular church attendance among the immigrant families and less privileged who worked in the mills and the nearby cotton factory.

On June 11th, 1850, on the Feast of St. Barnabas, the corner stone for our present St. Barnabas was laid. The chapel was completed and consecrated on December 11, 1851.

St. Barnabas has been in continuous use since 1850, serving South Carroll and Howard Counties. In 1981, under the guidance of the vestry and former rector Joe Burroughs, the church was restored preserving the original architecture. The stonework, pews, altar and windows are all original, as well as most of the woodwork and hardware.
